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THEO DAPORE EXPERIMENTAL ART

In past times, we can appreciate how others have expressed their days of simplicity through influences such as Monet and Van Gogh or painful moments with artists Pablo Picasso and Rembrant. Observing the works of impactful craftsmen, we can learn how artists of the present lifetime are merging traditional art with digital technology.

Designing contemporary art for the present period is innovation pushed to find new inspiration. Experimental methods are essential for expressing a common message in a fresh new way. These perspectives connect harmoniously by sharing the experience between artists and evolving generations.

One of the craftsmen of our time is contemporary artist, Theo Dapore, a 55-year-old resident of a suburb outside of Cleveland, in Elyria, Ohio. The subject matter that he offers is abstract landscapes, seascapes, and floral paintings. Acrylic and oil paint are used on hand stretched canvas. Non-traditional tools include custom made palette knives, plastic wrap, floor brooms, Styrofoam, wood, and finger painting. These methods are experimental because it is far from the rules of painting with paintbrushes or graphite pencils.

“Dapore leaps outside the box with extreme objects to

capture the results that are clearly a one of a kind.”

Most artwork is a triptych production that contains large brush strokes created with a very wide, three inch, brush, consistent light source, and blending wet paint for the smooth gradient effects. Rather than using a painter's palette bright colors are mixed directly onto the canvas.

Thousands of original abstract paintings sold both domestically and internationally the unique style is accomplished on a large scale, which pleases customers who are in need of big statement pieces. Although there are smaller sizes available, a large number of productions called triptychs measure as big as 96 inches wide and 8 inches high.

CHARLOTTE FUNG MILLER SHARES HER HERITAGE THROUGH TRADITIONAL CHINESE ART

Native to Chinatown of San Francisco, California Charlotte Fung Miller is a unique and charming artist who completely embraces her heritage in everything she does. It is important to share with others about who she is and where she comes from. Charlotte is a master at her craft with 9 years studying traditional Chinese Brush Painting and 7 years of Chinese Calligraphy under Lui-Sang Wong of San Francisco.



All original artwork are productions of classic and Chinese painting techniques applied to rice paper. They feature three primary categories Birds & Flowers, Animals, and Landscapes. Watercolor is a delight to many works, as transitions of color create illusions of shadows and depth. The use of color individualizes Charlotte's style.

Now residing in Mukwonago, Wisconsin, scenes of the Midwest have become new inspiration for experimenting applications in her craft. It is a new subject matter that pushes her reverence of peace and serenity of changing seasons.

Experimentation takes place not only with painting techniques, but also with reproducing fine art through printmaking. There are two methods used for reproducing fine art called lithography and giclee printing.

Lithography works with oils and water so ink can be transferred to other materials using a flexible aluminum plate. In this case, Charlotte uses this method for limited edition works printed on art conservation, 100% acid-free paper. These lithographs can be matted, unmatted, or framed with matting.

Another printmaking method used for reproducing fine art is with Giclee printing. Unlike lithography, Giclee printing is a method using inkjet printers that preserves artwork. Computer generated reproductions are used with inkjet printers manufactured by Canon, Epson, and HP that spray pigmented inks to produce high quality prints. The long-lasting inks can preserve artwork as much as 100 years. This is great, because the inks maintain image quality without fading.

Charlotte can be seen at many arts & crafts shows throughout the Midwest. She has received many honors including TV appearances, best




Custom lettering is at the heart of any design. A sketch placed on drawing paper with the flicks, strokes, and scribbles of a pencil simultaneously reveals the identity in a brand, illustration, logo, and custom typography. Communicating with words is essential to connecting with an audience.

Consistent practice with traditional methods is equally important as using digital technology. Lindsey Kellis Meredith is a freelance designer who specializes in logo/identity, custom lettering, and illustration.



Following in her father's footsteps, she entered the design world with a passion for drawing and solving the most creative problems for diverse markets such as athletics, fashion apparel, toys, ministries, restaurants domestically and abroad.

Using her education and talents, Lindsey brings consistency to traditional methods of typography as she shares expertise with an emphasis that sketching first can be just as powerful as any editing programs. Where Photoshop or Illustrator can proudly show what they are made of, we must not forget hands-on techniques. In one tutorial called "Create a Chalkboard Effect." We learn about the objectives for creating this effect includes digitizing the hand-drawn lettering, adding a clipping mask, level adjustments, and texture will make the effect realistic. Many concepts developed by Lindsey are sketched by hand, scanned into the computer, and then boost the artwork digitally.

In Illustrator we get a peak at Lindsey's style. When she created the Vikings example it was important to keep points adjacent to one another within the peaks and valleys of each letter, because letters are built into multiple pieces to supply easy management later on when

it is time for more refining. Any aspiring artist can apply the same kinesthetic techniques in their own unique way!

Try It Out!

Start tracing the sketch with the pen tool—set to have a stroke with no fill. Once the tracing is complete, the shapes can be filled and the center areas can be popped out in letters such as A's, K's, G's, and S's using the pathfinder. A black fill is great for showing more inconsistencies and adjusting line-weight issues throughout the design. Finally, take a step back to look at areas that need tweaking—zoom in and out while looking for anything that doesn't exactly meet up. Feel free to get finicky so that everything is well balanced and in the correct place. Complex sketches may need to be inked before digitizing the artwork. However, the process is the same with added refining.



twist on all sorts of things. Crowder says music must be changed up all the time. It needs to be made a new experience each time a person listens to it.



BARBARA IRWIN GOES GREEN WITH RECYCLED ART

There are many mediums that artists use for custom productions. There are artists, who use paintbrushes, pencils, software, fabrics...the list goes on, and on, but the most interesting artist is commonly found in your own backyard. For nearly thirty years, Barbara Irwin is an assembly artist who often made unique collages and renovated gifts for family, friends, birthdays, and home décor. It wasn't until her forty's when her work is recognized.

With an associate's degree of art, an

undergraduate degree in interior design, and a Montessori teaching certificate, Ms. Irwin is a self-taught assembly artist. A trip to Hawaii was the start of a new journey, as a neighboring friend asked to purchase a collage hanging on a wall in Irwin's home. A recycle-art exhibition was coming to the area, and so she was asked to submit a piece for the opening show.

"Whether I'm pulling weeds in my garden, cooking a meal, or creating a piece of

art, I approach it all in an artistic and artful way."

Photography is a way of seeing the world as the artist's sees it, yet found objects is about seeing castaway treasures that can be transformed into playful objects, shapes, textures, patterns, and colors. An opened eye on what can become a new transformation is a great way to recycle, repurpose, and reuse.

Irwin's art is experimental, because no pre-planning is involved in putting together sculptures—it all spontaneously emerges from wherever her imagination goes. Interiors of dolls' heads, abstract spiritual pieces, extraordinary lamps with hidden treasures, and garden features all find new and different ways to expose their true beauty and uniqueness. Pulling weeds from the garden, cooking, and creating new art her artesian skills are deeply rooted. The goal of her art is to help others see things in a new life.

Sometimes they are invited into her home studio. Although it is rather boring on the outside, it is a wonder world of creativity. Many times guests leave wanting to create, clean and organize their living space, or both. People throughout the community who refer their old items as junk are often left at Irwin's doorstep.



The greatest lesson taken from Irwin is she started her art at an unexpected age. Being in the right place at the right time, around the right people made the connections that changed her life doing one thing that she loved doing even if it meant it was not earning a living. A mentality like that emphasizes what a person was destined to do something greatly powerful.




Photography, acrylic, and digital painting make up this composition called, Helix. Original paintings range from \$240-2,025.

Red, yellow, black, and white everything is precious in color as it theorizes every aspect of life that are logical and useful: color defines how concepts are seen, as our eyes align with strong communication surrounding us. Color relates to us in marketing, vision, science, symbolism, and the body.

In the arts, Sir Isaac Newton developed the color wheel, a diagram scientists and artists

use and study to create productions that show balance and harmony. There are three color wheels that make all the color combinations available: primary colors, secondary colors, triadic colors that create the basic colors. Every color in between is based on mixing hues to create varying shades. The use of these color wheels are arranged in such a way a visual experience is delightful to the eye.

Since color is all about seeing, photographer Gary Williams amplifies the use of color to the extreme capturing incredible compositions. Williams travels all along the west coast—California, Oregon, Alaska, and Oregon. Extreme color is what pushes these photos to become their absolute best. From monochromatic schemes to a complimentary theme, the slightest enhancements from a photo editor like Photoshop truly make these images

speak for themselves.

On William's blog, each picture worthy of sharing with the public have a brief description of how the compositions came together. Some experimental work includes motion blurs, animals, landscapes, and iconic festivals that occur throughout the United States.

Here are a few examples. The first is a part of the motion blur collection, a series of floral compositions made by a slow shutter speed. Zooming in and out, moving from side to side, and up and down all while the shutter is open gratifies such results.

The next photo is at the New Mexico's hot air balloon festival. Williams visited the expedition before dawn. The lighting of the balloons was a quick capture. They have propane burners which means there were only several seconds before taking the shot (a 1/50th a second), so Williams set the f/stop to 1.8 and an ISO of 800. The contrast of the dark sky and the glowing color of balloons were very dramatic and so worth waiting for!

Find the balance and live in the present moment. Photography is one design medium Williams uses for meditation in this chaotic world. Taking a moment to look at the world around us lays true beauty for all to see right before our eyes. 


What's Your Favorite Color?

Even though I do not like




red or yellow, they make the secondary colors that I like: green and purple.

The range of shades is bright as bubble gum and pale as skin. To use pink in a composition with blue would have to be adjusted to a dark/bright pink. Mixing pink with blue creates berry colors, which have a warming effect. Mixing pink with yellow creates salmon colors or orange-based colors. It could trigger a child-like emotion, as it is fluffy and soft. Pink is a pale red, and I do not like red. Pink washes out my features and just does nothing to benefit me. For me to wear red, it must be dark. I like dark bold colors.

The composition was challenging because the color combination is not one that works harmoniously for me. It was hard to think of how to work with the colors, so after several attempts the emotion of the bittersweet relationship between them resulted in abstract triangles arranged in a careless way. The tool used for this composition was the pen in Photoshop. Variations in tints and shades made it interesting to look at, because the eyes create

illusions of blending colors. Overall, I am pleased on the outcome.



A woman who has a reconstructive passion for putting all the broken pieces together thoughtfully for living organisms, Anne Ten Donkelaar is a true engineer, observing new systems that elevate any object's performance, especially if they are meant to fly. Anything in nature such as twigs, small insects, and flowers are implemented with humanistic materials including thread, pins, and maps. Each material tells the story of where the object has been.

Utilitarian workspace is where inspiration is found; Anne works with some of the most delicate creatures: butterflies. Creative experimentation pushes out-of-the-box solutions to the most common problems of broken wings, lost bodies, or antennas that have been unfortunately amputated. Anne doctors up these creatures with prosthetics that increase mobility in the new life. One example is when a butterfly loses its wing, yet it is reconstructed with thread and pins. Another similar butterfly also loses its ability to fly, yet Anne creates new "wings"—a parachute and a propeller.



Flowers

Flower construction is another experimental process where storytelling about imaginary planets that shower flowers in ways no one has ever seen before. Imagine walking through a field of "elevated flowers," pressed flowers. Cut out pictures become three-dimensional from precisely placed pins, which profoundly adds depth.

Jewelry

As if Anne's artesian skills have not inspired you, take a look at the jewelry pieces created from charms in nature. Phenomenal artifacts have made special necklaces, earrings, bracelets and the like for a one of a kind set. Netherland companies, Bumblebee Co. and Wittenoord cater Anne's success. 

One Experimental Idea

Exercising the creative process takes all the child-like behaviors and put them into practice. From exaggerated dragons turning into butterflies after they have eaten skittles is imaginary, yet they all have some amusement in developing interesting ideas for what the future brings. Predictions for a digital world, we embrace human cyborgs, electronic machines create unheard or seen experiences. Exploring new technology will make our imaginations tell a true story.

One idea that would be interesting to have in a digital environment is an app, website, or program that is able to research images uploaded or scanned into the computer to be reviewed. If a person has a picture and wants to know more about it but has not a clue of where to start searching, the image could be a piece of information that the computer can review. It works in reverse of the modern search engines. The use of keywords would be replaced with an image. Even though there is a library for images that are hosted by search engines, there is not a way to find more about the image without having some known knowledge.

This new tool can help people who want to know more about a picture.

For example, a person who is unfamiliar with Monet and had a painting. The artwork can be sent through the new search engine and there, they can find information related to it. It would bring clarity that, that picture is indeed a Monet production. An old family picture can be searched so that people can learn about their ancestors. It would bring a new approach to finding out what we did not know before. With matching keywords to pictures it is a technology that will make finding resources easier. They already have Instagram for pictures, so it is on the way to making an imagery search engine possible.

A photographic search engine would be a great benefit to digital experimentation, as it shows designers of all levels what others are doing. Visual learning will be at an all time high as they can study what others have done. 
